The Educational Context & Environment

There are many choices for learners post16, including other colleges, school sixth forms and private providers.

Despite a decline in the teenage demographic and an increase in the choice available, the College has maintained a vibrant and thriving 16-18 community. The student body is very diverse and there has been an increase in the number of students from the South Birmingham area.

There are significant opportunities for the College to further develop its 16-18 curriculum and provide opportunities for students from a wide range of the region's schools, including those from Dudley, Stourbridge and surrounding areas.



The Black Country lies within the devolved West Midlands Combined Authority (WCMA), under the leadership of its Mayor, Andy Street. The Adult Education Budget is in the process of being fully devolved to the WMCA, who will exert significant influence over what and how education is funded for adults. This presents an opportunity for Halesowen College to be more involved with the delivery of skills for adults and address the needs of employers.

The College also maintains strong relationships with a range of stakeholders, including the Local Enterprise Partnership, universities, schools, multi academy trusts, employers and the local community.

Overall, changes to education policies could present the College with opportunities to evolve and develop. This will provide the community and local economy with improved services and, contribute to upskilling adults and preparing young people for employment.

Prudent financial management has meant that the College has outstanding financial health. It has continued to return year-onyear surpluses, placing it in a very strong position to move forward.
